Dear Cathedral Family,

I periodically am asked to speak to groups and organizations about Cathedral High School. I love to do this and the task is usually a pretty easy one for me. I don't mind public speaking and I always have great stories at my fingertips regarding the accomplishments of our students, faculty and staff.

I did struggle with a speaking assignment a few months ago. A group of private and independent school leaders wanted to speak to their group and address "why Cathedral High School is so successful." I struggled with this request. I usually don't develop remarks in a way that might seem overly proud or boastful. (Although we certainly have much to boast about!) And to be very honest, I was not absolutely certain that I had the answers that folks were looking for. Bright and talented students? A high quality faculty and staff? Adequate information technology supporting a robust academic curriculum? A beautiful and very efficient campus? A long and wonderful history with identifiable school spirit? An ambitious array of extra- and co-curricular activities including choir, band, athletics, theater, clubs? A spirit-filling campus ministry program with a meaningful retreat component? A highly regarded service outreach program? A safe, disciplined and orderly environment that makes the teaching and learning process possible? And others that I might have missed?

I knew all of these elements were part of the "answer" but I knew in my heart there were other pieces of the puzzle that would explain why Cathedral has worked so well, for so many students, for so long.

I received a phone call and was told that the sponsors of the event needed the title for my remarks...they needed to go to press.

I did share a title..."Cathedral's Theory of Reciprocity." I suspect at least some folks saw the title and thought they were really going to hear some deep and previously undisclosed secret explaining Cathedral's history of success. My theory really is not deep, is not a secret, and I suspect explains why most successful schools are successful.

The theory is quite simple. Our faculty and staff love their students. They demonstrate this love by their actions in and out of the classroom...every time they are interacting with their students.

Cathedral students know they are loved.

The students reciprocate. They love their teachers, coaches, counselors, moderators and other adults with whom they interact at school. The students feel safe, cared for and encouraged. They stretch and take risks...knowing that this circle of support surrounds them. Our students accomplish much more than they initially thought they could.

It is the good work that takes place in the space created by this reciprocal affection that, in my opinion, explains why this school works.

And you mothers and fathers were the first teachers. You helped build young men and women who could enroll at this school and be open to the love that the adults here hold for them. And for that, I thank you!

Algebra One Proficiency Testing for Class of 2014

The Indiana Department of Education has indicated that the pass/fail mark for the Algebra One End-of-Course Assessment (formerly known as the Core 40 exam) will not be set until well after school begins. Cathedral had intended to use the ECA scores to help determine the mathematics course placement of our incoming students. Obviously, we have had to revise our plans.

Any incoming freshman student who wishes to be placed into geometry will need to take a proficiency test. This test will cover the Indiana standards for Algebra One. This test will be offered at no charge on five different dates. It is approximately 1.5 hours in length. Calculators are not allowed. The minimum passing score is 85%. (Students who request an alternative testing date will be charged the regular \$10 proficiency test fee.)

Students who score at least 85% on the proficiency test will be placed into geometry at the level indicated by their eighth grade placement test. Students who score less than 85% will be placed into an algebra one class at the level indicated by their placement test.

When the ECA scores are released, the parents of any student who passed the test should immediately forward a copy of the official score report to Mrs. Susie Thornburg, registrar.

To ensure adequate space, test materials, and proctors,

interested students are asked to preregister for the Algebra One proficiency test. The available dates are:

2010-11 Service Hour Criteria

The annual service requirement is a minimum of 25 hours. The criteria are:

1. The service is to be performed for someone outside the student's family and neighborhood. It may be served for non-profit organizations or disadvantaged individuals. A list of non-profit organizations can be found on the web under On Campus/Service Outreach. HOT TIPS on new opportunities are posted each week on the Cathedral Web site under On Campus/Service Outreach/Current Service Opportunities (<http://www.cathedral-irish.org/page.cfm?p=980>).
2. The student should not receive any compensation for his/her service. It is not acceptable to work at one's employment or for a relative's company without receiving compensation and to submit it as service.
3. It is important to incorporate community service in the performed service. It is also not acceptable to have all twenty-five hours coming from on-campus Cathedral service and leadership.
4. Baby sitting and neighbor help will not be accepted as service.
5. Activities for which extra credit is given in a class will not count toward the service requirement. Activities taking place during class time when classes are missed are generally not valid for service.
6. As long as credit was not already received as a grade, service hours accumulated from a Service Learning Project for a specific class may count up to five hours of the required 25 hours. A grade is earned for the senior religion class Habitat for Humanity build and therefore cannot be accepted as service outreach hours. Service performed during class time cannot be credited as service hours.
7. The service must be documented on the 2010-11 Cathedral Service Documentation Form and turned into Mrs. Halstead in the Commons next to Fr. Munshower. The deadline for these forms is as follows:
Freshman, Sophomores, Juniors by March 1, 2011.
Seniors: All service hours are due by Dec 1, 2010.
Late reporting of service hours will result in the withholding of the third quarter report for all students. Students should turn in their documentation forms as soon as their service has been completed. In order to be considered for service awards made at the end of each academic year at the end of April, service hours should be completed and submitted by April 4, 2011.
8. Service hours will be shown as completed or not completed on semester report cards. Additional visibility is provided in Parent School. In PowerSchool, there is a button in the upper right corner of the screen which reads Service Hours. Click on it and it will provide the service detail and summary by year.
9. A senior failing to complete their hours will not meet the requirements for graduation. For the class of 2011, a graduating senior should be achieving 100 service hours in total by completing their annual service requirement of twenty five hours during their four years of high school attendance at Cathedral. If a student transfers to Cathedral after their freshman year, this total is pro-rated. Because it is intended that our students engage in service hours each year during their four years, a student may not earn ahead their hours for each subsequent year. It is required that twenty five service hours be earned each year. All earned service hours are applauded and are recorded to show their total effort. A certificate listing these hours is available for college and scholarship application upon request.
10. Information supplied on the Cathedral Service Documentation Form will be reviewed for authenticity. Service must be validated by an agency representative when performed or by a parent.
11. If you prefer to develop a project basis for your service, see Service Project Basis under Service Outreach on the web for the details and guidelines.
12. The spirit of the service requirement speaks to the desired character of a Cathedral student. Failure to meet this requirement may put into question a student's enrollment at Cathedral for the following school year. CATHEDRAL HIGH SCHOOL
TUITION ASSISTANCE POLICY (2010-11 SCHOOL YEAR)

Through the generosity of alumni, parents and friends of the school, Cathedral is able to offer tuition assistance (financial aid) to families with demonstrated financial need. There are no scholarships given for extracurricular activities of any kind (i.e., no athletic scholarships are given to any student.).

Tuition assistance funds are limited and therefore will not cover the total cost of a Cathedral High School education. Assistance is offered to families with demonstrated need who adhere to our published time frames and guidelines. Families applying for tuition assistance are strongly encouraged to follow all instructions and apply as soon as possible. Families wishing to be considered for tuition assistance must file the required forms or apply online on an annual basis. If families have more than one child enrolled at Cathedral, it is necessary to file only one form. If all children in the family are of school age, Cathedral encourages both parents to be employed outside the home unless there are extenuating circumstances. The Tuition Assistance Committee recommends that, whenever possible, Cathedral students age 16 and over share responsibility for their private education through summer employment and, to the extent possible, through part-time employment during the school year. There are a limited number of Work Study assignments available on campus. Final responsibility for tuition rests with parents, who, in the estimation of the committee, should to the extent they are able take steps necessary to assume financial obligation for their children's private education.

APPLYING FOR TUITION ASSISTANCE FOR THE 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR

- 1) Step One: Submit the Parents' Financial Statement (PFS) to School and Student Service for Financial Aid (SSS)—We are encouraging families to complete this form online (www.sss.nais.org) as soon as possible and no later than Feb. 28, 2010. DO NOT RETURN THIS FORM TO CATHEDRAL HIGH SCHOOL.

Cathedral High School's SSS code is 2172.

In the case of parents who are divorced or legally separated, the parent with primary physical custody of the student must file the PFS form regardless of financial agreement between parents.

- 2) Step Two: Submit Tax Documents—Submit a copy of all 2009 signed federal tax forms, together with W-2 statements and all schedules, for each parent listed on the Parents' Financial Statement (PFS) to the Enrollment Management Office at Cathedral High School as soon as possible but no later than April 15, 2010. DO NOT SEND TAX COPIES TO SSS. Cathedral High School reserves the right to request supporting documentation including divorce decrees and custodial agreements.

If you will be filing a tax extension request, you must provide Cathedral a copy of your extension form. As soon as your taxes are complete, submit a copy to Cathedral High School. Awards issued pending completion of tax returns will be subject to revision after submission of completed tax returns.

Tuition assistance decisions will be mailed to all families meeting the February 28 deadline by early May 2010. Late applications (those postmarked after Feb. 28, 2010) will be processed in the order in which they are received, although tuition assistance is not guaranteed under these circumstances. Award decisions for late applications may not be processed in time to be mailed by early May. Evaluation of tuition assistance requests will begin in a timely manner following Cathedral's receipt of the computer-generated Report of Financial Need (RFN) from SSS. The RFN form serves as a guideline to help determine need; however, Cathedral is not bound by the figure generated by the SSS. The distribution of tuition assistance resources adheres to the guidelines for tuition assistance adopted by the Cathedral Board of Directors.

All sophomores and juniors at Cathedral take this exam on this day. **For seniors** it is a day, since they are not required to be here, we encourage for college visitation. If seniors visit a college on this day and bring back a signed verification form of their visits, they are granted an additional college visit day.

Summer Tips for Visiting Colleges

Many of the juniors will be visiting campuses this summer in anticipation of the fall application season. Some things to remember on your visit.

- Get a campus tour and admissions presentation by signing up in advance with each college's admissions office.
- Ask to sit in on a class if you have a particular interest or major in mind.
- Some schools will allow overnights in the dorm, check on that in advance.
- Eat a meal in an on campus dining hall.
- After your tour ask students on campus what they like/dislike about the school.
- Always stop by the Financial Aid Office to see how they handle scholarships and what aid is available.
- Meet with a professor or advisor of a program in which you may have interest.
- Pick up an edition of the college's newspaper.
- Build in some free time to walk around the campus on your own
- Keep a journal or notes on each school that you can refer back to at a later time.
- If you have an individual meeting with an admissions counselor, professor, or anyone else associated with the school send a thank you note!

NCAA Eligibility Center Registration

Juniors who are interested in playing Division I or II athletics should register with the NCAA Eligibility Center at the **end of junior year**. Go to www.ncaaclearinghouse.net and follow the steps under "Prospective Student Athletes." There is a cost of \$60 to register. After registering be sure to complete the amateurism questionnaire. You **must let us know** that you have applied to the Eligibility Center so official transcripts can be sent. A reminder that you must have SAT and/or ACT scores **sent directly from the testing agency** to the Eligibility Center. The NCAA does not accept test scores off the high school transcript. The code for the Eligibility Center is 9999 when requesting scores from either testing organization.

SUMMER READING POLICY FOR SCHOOL YEAR 2010-2011

Cathedral High School students are required to read two (2) books; however, at least one specific book is required for each grade level. Students may choose the second book from the list provided. The required book will facilitate additional discussion and study in each class during the school year to complement the existing literature curriculum on each level. The summer reading tests for both books will be given on Thursday, August 19, 2010, in all English classes. These tests will count for 10% of the student's first quarter English grade. STUDENTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO HIGHLIGHT AND TO TAKE CHAPTER NOTES WHILE READING THE SELECTIONS IN ORDER TO FACILITATE REVIEW BEFORE TAKING THE TESTS IN THE FALL. Please be advised that books should be ordered/purchased early from retail stores to ensure adequate reading time. We also strongly encourage students to purchase copies of required reading books and to be prepared to bring these to class.
